

Saturday, March 17th Meeting 175th Anniversary of John J. Audubon's Expedition Up The Missouri River

With the artistic, financial, and scientific success of the Birds of America behind him, in 1843 John James Audubon set out on a steamship voyage up the Missouri River in search of material for a new project, an equally ambitious illustrated work on the continent's mammals. The expedition did not go quite as planned: John Bachman, Audubon's co-author, complained that the trip brought back hardly any usable specimens, and scientific ornithology has deemed it essentially a waste of time.



It was anything but. Bell's Vireo, Baird's Sparrow, and Harris's Sparrow all owe their names, and in different ways their discoveries,

to Audubon's expedition, and his journals and paintings, along with the notes and memoirs left by some of his companions, preserve a priceless picture of the eastern Great Plains on the verge of "civilization' – and of a brilliant and colorful American naturalist at the end of his career.

We have been sharing with our beginning birders locations that have been birded year after year by local experts. It has always been our goal to show field trip participants where to bird close to home. This spring season we are interested in introducing new birding locations and adding another field trip per month. When speaking to Denise Lewis, director of the Raptor Refuge program at Fontenelle Forest, she knew of 5 or 6 Snowy Owls who had been rescued, only one made it as the others were so hungry they weren't able to recover from their exhaustion.

DONATE DIRECTLY FROM IRA, TAX-FREE

IRA owners age 70-1/2 or older are able to make a <u>direct transfer</u> of a distribution from their IRA trustee to a qualified charity, up to 100,000 annually. This amount is not taxable and may be excluded from the IRA owner's taxable income. If this is done, no additional tax deduction is available for these funds.
