I recently met one of our members on our October field trip. She said she'd been reading the newsletter and often told herself she ought to go on one of our field trips. When she finally came, she got a two for one. Birds and a new place to bird, Wehrspann Lake. She's lived in Omaha for decades but never knew anything about this birding spot. When field trip participants discover different natural places in Omaha while birding, hopefully it creates a new option for them that ultimately increases their outdoor time.

Now back to Wehrspann Lake where my husband and I went birding last week. We observed a pair of reddish-orange canvasbacks in the afternoon sun. We have observed the list of birds below at Wehrspann Lake. It truly is a crown jewel birding location!

Here's the kind of details you can garner when birding with others. Following is a page from my field guide.

"So we parked at the boat dock. North of that parking lot, pine trees grow along the edge of the lake. We walked almost to the edge, but turned to the West and walked in between the pines. We went about 70 yards, then tiptoed towards the edge and set up our scope. We have seen the following bird species within the last three days, during two visits. Both times were in the afternoon, one was between 1:30 and 2:30 and the other 3:15 and 4:30."

What was most notable is that we saw 12 different species and there were, by our estimation, just 100 ducks. During the first visit we were excited to see Common Goldeneyes. On our second visit the Common Goldeneyes were gone, but the Barrows Goldeneyes were there. It was not confirmed by an expert birder that they were Barrows, but with bird book in hand, we specifically looked for the shape of the 'eyespot', and on the first visit it was round. We noticed it was lower and more crescent shaped on the second visit and the female was clearly identified to be a Barrows Goldeneye. Will follow up with Bob and Clem regarding identification.
