January Meeting: Whooping Cranes, Interior Least Terns, and Piping Plovers: Nebraska's Three Most Imperiled Birds

Join Mary Bomberger Brown of the Tern and Plover Conservation Partnership for a conversation about three bird species found in Nebraska that are protected

by the Endangered Act: Whooping Cranes, Interior Least Terns, and Piping Plovers. For nearly 20 years, the Tern and Plover Conservation Partnership has worked to protect these birds (and the people who share their habitat) in Nebraska in a collaborative, non-confrontational style.

Birds are altering the timing of critical life history events in response to global climate change. Whooping Cranes are one of the most critically endangered birds in the world, with remnant population numbers between 300–400 individuals. Their

migration is now occurring earlier in spring by approximately 22 days and later in fall by approximately 21 days. These observations have conservation implications, as the timing of migration and availability of resources are critical to the cranes' survival.

Interior Least Terns and Piping Plovers nest in Nebraska, historically on river sandbars,





but increasingly on industrial and residential habitats like sand and gravel mines, lakeshore housing developments, and dredging operations. Learn how the Tern and Plover Conservation Partnership approaches the protection of these imperiled species nesting in such perilous habitats and how well these species are moving toward recovery.

This is a free public event, so feel free to invite friends.

February Meeting: Birds of Nebraska - Online Thursday, February 7 at 7pm • Fontenelle Forest Nature Center

ASO is proud to partner with Fontenelle Forest Bird Club to bring in Joel Jorgensen for a talk about a new website, Birds of Nebraska – Online, that he co-created with Ross Silcock. Nebraska has a rich history of bird study that extends over two centuries. Birds of Nebraska - Online is a combination of all existing and available information about Nebraska's birds, their distribution and temporal occurrence, in a format that can be



updated. It is a traditional state bird reference in an open-access online format with stand-alone species accounts. Please join us as we learn more about how to use this amazing tool!

Help Track the Effects of Climate Change – and Help the Birds You Love

Audubon's Birds and Climate Change Report predicts that more than 300 US bird species will lose more than half of their climatic range due to climate change by 2080. Join Audubon Society of Omaha and Audubon Nebraska as we participate in Audubon's new community science program, Climate Watch.

If you can identify bluebirds and nuthatches by sight and sound, or are eager to learn, put your bird knowledge to use and help us conduct surveys to see how these species are already responding to climate change in our area.

2019 will have two opportunities for conducting Climate Watch surveys, January 15 to February 15 and again between May 15 and June 15. And watch for more information in your March/April newsletter on details, but rumor has it Jason "the Birdnerd" St. Sauver will be presenting all about the Climate Watch project for our March meeting.

Where to Recycle Styrofoam and Keep It Out of the Landfill

An Omaha business, Plastilite, has a place for you to drop off those styrofoam products used for packing and for some containers. They don't accept those small boxes restaurants use for your takehome food, nor do they accept plastic peanuts. Images on the drop box will inform you about the items they do and do not accept.

One of their sites is located just north of McKinley St (Highway 36). To access it, turn north on 48th street, (not the 48th St 680 exit – just the street). Off 48th Street, take the first left. Plastilite is the second business ahead of you (easy to identify). Go past a couple of buildings until you see the blue and white recycling container on your right.

Get rid of the styrofoam and help protect our environment!

DONATE DIRECTLY FROM IRA, TAX-FREE

IRA owners age 70-1/2 or older are able to make a <u>direct transfer</u> of a distribution from their IRA trustee to a qualified charity, up to 100,000 annually. This amount is not taxable and may be excluded from the IRA owner's taxable income. If this is done, no additional tax deduction is available for these funds.
